As I continue thinking and wondering about what it means for us to be "together" as Spirit of Joy (Click here to see January's newsletter) I find myself thinking about what it means to "love one another". It's February, so I'm thinking about Valentine's Day. And, I've got on my calendar to begin pre-marital

counseling with two couples getting married this summer as Spirit of Joy. So, the verses above popped to mind. Frequent wedding verses, they are part of a larger section in Paul's letter to the congregation in Colossae. He's offering to them a way to live given the pulls and attraction of the secular life in Asia Minor (Turkey). Central to that way of life is, yes, renunciation of certain teachings and practices, but more importantly, the radical and transformative practice of Christian love.

You see, as I think about what it means for us to be "together" in 2024, I find myself thinking far less about statements of belief or intellectual exercises, but about intentional practices of community. Expressions of love made for one another, for our community, because we believe in the one true God.

Dr. Marcus Borg said the following to Calvary Episcopal Cathedral in Memphis, Tennessee during a lunch series in March 2001:

"I want to comment very quickly on the ancient meanings of "credo" and of "believe." Credo is the word from which we get the word creed, and it's also the opening word of the Nicene Creed and the Apostle's Creed. Very strikingly, the roots of the word in both Greek and Latin do not mean, I agree with my intellect that the following statements are true, but rather mean, I give my heart to, I give my self at its deepest level to. To what, to these statements? No. I give my heart to God. Which God? The creator of Heaven and Earth. I give my heart to Jesus. Which Jesus? The one who was born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate and so forth. These are statements of what I give my loyalty to.

The pre-modern meaning of the word "believe." For many modern people it means believing something to be true, though there are reasons to think otherwise. If you go back to the English language before the Enlightenment, Shakespeare and before, the word "believe" invariably means "love." You see this in the Middle English word believen. That is where you get the modern English word "believe." Believen means to belove, so that ultimately, what you believe really means what you belove."

In relationships, this means no matter how many times we say, "I love you" the words stand hollow without the physical acts of relationship, orientation, and care to back them up. And, it is a two way street, with both partners responsible for their expressions. The same is true in our relationship with God. We may say together, "I believe in God." Or, "I love God." But, the words are hollow without the physical acts of relationship, orientation, and care. God has given us the only begotten Son as a gift of grace and love.


So, this year, look for invitations to practice community in the name of your faith. Seek out opportunities to tell the people in your life that you love them as an expression of your beliefs. And, in loving one another, we will, *together*, love God. And, as always, remember that the community of the divine has chosen you, claimed you, and called you beloved.



This year, your Worship Staff and Team is excited to invite you to join us for a two-part, 12 week series, titled "Washed and Fed".

We begin when we welcome Rev. Jeff Backer of St. Dysmas Prison Congregation for Baptism of our Lord Sunday on January 7th. The first six weeks will focus on baptism. The font will move to the front center of our worship space and we'll ask you to remember your baptism each and every time you come forwards to the table. Our liturgy, sermons, and music will all reinforce the tag line for those first six weeks, "Refreshed".

The second half of the series will carry us through the season of Lent, ending on Palm Sunday. The most noticeable difference for this season will be the realignment of our liturgy. Lutheran worship has four parts: Gather, Word, Meal, and Send. For this season, we are going to ask you to join us in coming to the Meal first. Our idea and a centerpiece of our planning is that the gift of God's grace is so important, so freeing, so vital, that we simply can not wait, and must Come to the Table as fast as possible. This hurry will bring us to The Table where our tagline for the final six weeks remind us that we are, "Refueled."



Each week of Lent we will read an interaction of Jesus with a different disciple. The first week we'll explore those first calls for disciples through the lens of Philip and Nathanael. Then, in the second week, we'll give thanks for the unexpected call of Matthew, the tax collector. From there we'll hear again the story of Peter, James, and John, awed by the appearance of Moses and Elijah as Jesus was transfigured before them. The fourth week of Lent we'll wonder what it means to be a friend of Jesus in light of the beloved disciple leaning against him to ask who would betray Jesus. And, finally, at our final gathering we'll ask ourselves for honesty as we consider how we betray Jesus in light of Judas' betrayal.

Grounded by space for deep breaths and comforting silence, each week will feature the scripture reading, a brief reflection, a question for personal reflection, and a number of hands-on faith practices, including Holy Communion.

Maundy Thursday (6:30 March 28), it will all come together as the Spirit of Joy Choir joins a company of our partners to embody the story of that last night among friends we call, The Last Supper. We'll celebrate our first communion milestone and remember the command to love one another as Jesus first loved us.





YAGM News

Christmas Time

I was worried going into the Christmas season, we were warned that this time can be difficult for YAGM volunteers and it was. With no host family, I worried I would spend Christmas alone. Thankfully this fear did not come true. Members of the church invited me to lunch on Christmas Eve. We ate apple soup, carrots, potatoes, and fish! It was great to share traditions with one another and spend time with the couples one-year-old! After lunch, we set up the Christmas tree and decorated it. In Hungary, it's tradition to set up the tree and decorate it on Christmas Eve. People are shocked when I tell them many people in America set up their trees shortly after Thanksgiving, I also learned that it is Jesus or Angels who bring the gifts on Christmas Eve, not Santa Clause. Rather, Santa comes on December 6th and leaves candy in the boots of the kids. After decorating, we sang hymns in Hungarian and English, which was a comfort to me, as my family sings carols every Christmas Eve. Similar to my church at home, the church service was packed and hard to find a spot!







Christmas Day was spent at church in the morning- which was a first for me as my family spends Christmas morning at home making lefse and playing in the snow with our cousins. After the service, I joined the Pastor and his family for lunch!



According to the ELCA website, ashes are symbolic of attributes of our human existence: (1)"Ashes remind us of God's condemnation of sin, as God said to Adam, "Dust you are and to dust you shall return" (Genesis 3:19). (2) "Ashes suggest cleansing and renewal." (3) "Ashes remind us of the shortness of human life" (4) "Ashes are a symbol of our need to repent, confess our sins, and return to God."

As we reflect upon Ash Wednesday, may we also turn our attention to our brothers and sisters impacted by environmental justice issues. According to the National Resources Defense Council (NRDC), vulnerable communities are increasingly exposed to and/or burdened disproportionately by pollution and contamination. Ever heard of Cancer Alley in Louisiana? At one point, this 85-mile-long industrial stretch along the Mississippi River was once the site of sugar cane plantations and cornfields. Today more than 140 petrochemical plants are located here as well as 45,000 residents. This area has a higher-than-average number of cancer cases. Further, a higher percentage of residents here are Black, poor, and illiterate. This is an example of a "pollution hotspot" where communities are impacted by many sources of pollutants (not only petrochemical plants but incinerators and landfills, among others).

Recently, in Plaquemines parish (adjacent to Cancer Alley), residents were dealing with drought that led to low water pressure, not being able to wash hands or flush toilets, and saltwater coming out of faucets, etc. Residents were told to conserve water. At the same time, a new LNG (liquefied natural gas) terminal next door began its project and did not conserve water; they used anywhere from 13-24% of the water (exceeding 3.5 million gallons) while the people suffered, yet another example of environmental injustice.

Decades of research have shown that Black, Indigenous and brown communities have been on the forefront of environmental ills. This is multifactorial and multigenerational. Recently, there has been greater awareness as well as movements shining light on years of injustice. Other examples include inadequate access to healthy food, inadequate transportation and unsafe homes in areas of vulnerable populations.


"He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?"

Thank you to all of you who have responded so helpfully to our flood situation. It continues to amaze me to watch how we come together as a community. The following is for informational purposes. A brief summary of events and an intermediate range plan.


Monday, Jan. 22

6:15am Midwest Alarm notified Derris Kunkel (SoJ Facilities Manager) and Pr. Eric that there was an active alarm. Both arrived on site approximately 6:35am.

6:40am Fire Department shut off water to the building. Derris began removing water through the preschool entrance doors. Pr. Eric contacted Building Sprinkler, Intek, and SoJ staff and volunteers to begin cleanup.

7:15am Building Sprinkler arrived and began repairs. The first staff and volunteers began removing items from classrooms and offices. Derris moved to extraction, joined by Dave Tonsager.





10:00am Program Staff met offsite to discuss a short term plan. The decision was made to keep the preschool operational, which meant canceling, rescheduling, or relocating all other activities in the facility during the week. Shared hope was that we would be able to return items to offices and classrooms by Saturday, Jan. 27th.

1:00pm Water was restored to the building and the fire suppression system pressurized. Derris began removing cove base in three offices.

3:00pm Initial contact with insurance company and introduction to claim adjuster.



Tuesday, Jan. 23

10:00am Staff met onsite for regular business. Derris updated the team and the plan to be closed for the week affirmed.

1:00pm Preschool Director, Amy Cauble, and Preschool Teachers, Kendra Namanny and Jamie Appel, guided the staff in creating a makeshift preschool in The WELL, Shalom Center, Gathering Space, and the Sanctuary.

3:00pm Intek met with Derris to update fan and dehumidifier locations. Pr. Eric scheduled the claim adjuster for Wednesday morning.

Wednesday, Jan. 24

9:30am Claims Adjuster arrived and walked through with Derris. Several additional baseboards were identified for removal and small sections of sheetrock cut back to improve airflow.



1:00pm Intek arrived for further adjustments to fan and dehumidifier location. The initial assessment of 5-7 days was affirmed. Several areas of greater concern were identified that may cause longer term impacts.

Overall Impact



Roughly 1800-2000 square feet of the education and office wing were impacted including all offices on the southwest hallway, the preschool classrooms on both sides of the west hallway, and the Galilee Room. Activities were canceled and staff worked in a variety of fashions and locations. Material loss was minimal. Your staff did a good job storing things in containers and off the floor. No known personal items were lost.

We are currently awaiting decisions about further demolition including sheetrock and carpet. If further work is done, impacts will likely extend weeks to months. We have made the decision that we are able to proceed with Sunday and Wednesday Faith Formation, no matter the additional work. Other activities may continue to be rescheduled, relocated, or canceled.
